

"JAMES WEBB SPACE TELESCOPE TO INFINITY & BEYOND!!!"



Time machines really do exist! No, not a modified De Lorean like the one from Back to the Future, but a real life Space Telescope that will orbit the Sun and have the power to "go back in time" billions of years to 'see' the first light of the formation of our universe. We will discuss some of the basic features and capabilities of the James Webb Space Telescope and learn about how it will get to its final space orbit destination. Finally, we'll go into some of James Webb Space Telescope's main mission objectives including first light observation and understanding predicted first light objects.

Thursday, April 15 INTRODUCING NEW RESIDENT CATHERINE HUGHES AND MVGH BOARD OF TRUSTEES CHAIR SANDRA MADER.



Rev. Catherine Hughes was born in Crockett, Texas and moved to Los Angeles in 1945. Receiving most of her education in Los Angeles, she graduated from Jefferson High School in 1955. The Monday following graduation, she began working as a sales consultant for New York Fashion Shop on Vernon and Central. Catherine was married in 1959, and she and her husband had two children, Yolanda and Vincent. Sadly, in 1980, Vincent was killed in an auto accident at the age of 17. At the time, Catherine was working for the State of California as a Rehabilitation Consultant after completing her degree in Sociology from Cal State, Dominguez Hills in 1975. She worked for the State for twenty-three years before

retiring in 1987. Rev. Hughes knew as a teen she was 'called' to preach, but was unable to pursue her calling because she was born female. She was actively engaged in and faithfully served as President of the Women's Association, Sunday School Teacher, Coordinator or Youth and Young Adult Ministries, and was a Choir member at the Holy Light Missionary Baptist Church in Los Angeles. It was under the leadership of Dr. Richard Lamar Horton, pastor of the Eternal Promise Baptist Church, that she was able to pursue her calling as an ordained minister. She enrolled in Fuller Seminary in 1990; in 1992, she became Presbyterian and served with Dr. Isaiah Jones at Community United Presbyterian Church. Graduating from Fuller with a Master of Divinity, Rev. Hughes was ordained and became pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Los Angeles. Retired in 2003, she now serves many Presbyterian Churches on a regular basis, one of those being the Church community with which Jim and Barbara Mathieu worship. She preaches almost every Sunday reminding the saints to, "Remember, only what you do for Christ will last."



Sandra Mader is the Chair of the Monte Vista Grove Homes Board of Trustees. She has served on the Board for six years, but this is only a small part of her lengthy list of volunteer service. As an ordained Elder at First Presbyterian Church of Hollywood, she has been Clerk of Session and participated in or led a variety of committees and groups there. For the Presbytery of the Pacific, she's been Moderator of COM and Moderator of Presbytery. Sandra's professional career was as a high school teacher, librarian, and administrator. In non-Covid times she serves as a docent at the Huntington Library, Art Museum and Botanical Gardens, leading student tours and interpreting several collections with the public.

Peter Wehner will discuss his theological perspective on Christian faith in politics; the role of

evangelicals during the Trump era; and how the Christian church should think about cultural and political engagement going forward. He is Vice President and Senior Fellow at the Ethics and Public Policy Center in Washington, D.C. He is a contributing opinion writer for the *New York Times* and a contributing editor for *The Atlantic* magazine. Mr. Wehner served in the Ronald Reagan and George H.W. Bush administrations before becoming deputy director of speechwriting for President George W. Bush. He graduated from the University of Washington where he was active in the University Presbyterian Church. His newest book, <u>The Death of Politics: How to</u> <u>Heal Our Frayed Republic After Trump</u>, was published in June 2019.

Pasadena City College's Life Review Class is designed for older adults and focuses on




importance of life review as well as tips on how to create compelling stories for preservation of family history.

Thursday, May 6 *KRISTEN KOBES DU MEZ CALVIN UNIVERSITY HISTORY PROFESSOR* JESUS AND JOHN WAYNE: A CONVERSATION WITH KRISTIN DUMEZ



Kristin Kobes Du Mez is a professor of History and Gender Studies at Calvin University. Reared in Sioux Center, Iowa, a graduate of Dordt College (where her father was a professor), she holds a PhD from the University of Notre Dame. Her research focuses on the intersection of gender, religion, and politics. She has written for the *Washington Post*, *Religion News Service*, *Christianity Today*, and NBC, and has been interviewed on NPR, CTV, the CBC, BBC, and by CNN, the *New York Times*, and the AP, among other

outlets; she blogs at Patheos's "Anxious Bench" and is a featured podcast speaker. Her book, *Jesus and John Wayne: How White Evangelicals Corrupted a Faith and Fractured a Nation*, is a thoroughly researched and documented study of white evangelical views of masculinity from the Cold War to the present, and how this view of "manliness" affects everything in evangelical culture, from how women are treated, to how and why some politicians are admired. Dr. Du Mez is a gifted speaker and well-received in all circles. She's winsome, articulate, and determined to shed light on one of the darkest corners of the Christian Faith. Because truth matters to faith, even as faith matters to truth.

PREMIER TENOR JONATHAN MACK PRESENTS 4 pm THE MUSIC OF IRVING BERLIN



With this program, Jonathan Mack and his son Shannon will celebrate a wonderful American legacy left to us by Irving Berlin, who lived in New York City and died at the age of 101. He composed a bountiful collection of over 1,000 songs, including *Easter Parade, There's No Business Like Show Business,* and *God Bless America*. Along with some commentary, the Mack duo will present a sampler of 22 brief works, which will clearly demonstrate Berlin's remarkable flair for producing music and lyrics.

Following a B.A. in French horn and an M.A. in voice at USC, Jonathan served as an apprentice artist at Santa Fe Opera. Through a Rockefeller Grant, he then performed in Central European concert halls and opera houses for four years. He sang 18 years with LA Opera, while also working in sound studios and recording television and motion picture soundtracks. He has served as vocal instructor for several SoCal universities. Piano accompanist Shannon Mack is a gifted choral music director and composer, Glendale United School District.
